I am writing with regard to the application to grant a licence for the premises at 11 Chapel Street, Lancaster.

I wish to object to this proposed application.

My objection is for three reasons:-

Dear Sir/Madam,

We are residents living [REDACTED] the shop at 11 Chapel Street, Lancaster, LA1 1NZ. We oppose the shop becoming a bar licensed to serve alcohol and play recorded music until 1 am Mon-Sun and to play live music until 23:59 Mon-Sun for the following reasons.

We are key workers, working 9-5 Monday - Friday. We feel that the live music until 23.59 and recorded music and noise until 1am would be very disruptive to our sleep and wellbeing.

Furthermore, as we live [REDACTED] the bar adding to our concerns about noise and live music. The building is quite old (built in the 18th century) and sound travels easily.

We also share [REDACTED] with the shop and are concerned entering our home at night could be difficult due to people congregating and queuing to enter the bar. Furthermore, [REDACTED] could potentially feel unsafe entering and exiting her home at night alone.

We believe the suggested opening hours of the bar are unreasonable and will certainly be disruptive to us and likely affect our performances at work.
